Diocesan President's Report

Dear friends,

It is almost 1 year since I became D.P. and it has been a year of getting to know members and visiting branches. We celebrated our 140 years of the work of the Mothers' Union at Musselburgh last year which was a memorable service and lunch. Last year was an opportunity to re-establish ourselves and recognise what we can contribute as individuals and branches to the aims and objectives of the M.U. I look forward to visiting branches this year and continuing to get to know our members.

We are not able to take up every challenge that comes our way, and recognising this in the first step in making progress. We can however acknowledge the areas that we can and do contribute to, for example

Prayer, practical service in the community. Supporting projects and overseas work.

I have attended a variety of events since our last meeting which included an invitation to hear about the work of Care in the Community, which provides resources for families. (website

I attended a meeting of Women's groups in Scotland at 121 George St, representing the Provincial President. After the business meeting, we were given an illustrated talk about the refugee situation in Scotland. This was interesting and highlighted the plight of refugees in Scotland.

I was asked to attend an event to meet MSPs with Church representatives and Faith Leaders at the Scottish Parliament. This was both informative and an opportunity to meet representatives of other Churches and Faith groups.

On behalf of the Mothers' Union I attended the EMMS launch of Religions of the world charter for children's palliative care. We heard from speakers about the need for this charter as many children in different parts of the world do not receive the palliative care that they need, for example in India.

Meeting people from other faith organisations was interesting and stimulating and we need to reach out and join with other women's groups to share our experiences and support each other in the work carried out. When did your branch last invite a group from another women's organisation to join you for a social meeting with your members? This could be one aim for planning the next session of meetings in your branch.

I shall be attending the Worldwide Council in Dublin on 12/13 March which will be my first experience of meeting the other Diocesan and Provincial Presidents.

2017 gives us the opportunity to share our experiences and fellowship with people from other parts of the UK and abroad at the A.G.M on 30 September. As hosts we must make sure that members have a memorable experience and the events which include the service of evensong at 5.30pm on Friday 29 September will be followed by a Gala Dinner at the Roxburgh for members . The A.G.M on Saturday 30 September will be at the Edinburgh International Conference Centre which is a modern and custom built centre with good facilities and should provide members with a memorable experience.

As a Diocese, we may be small in numbers but we all share the same desire to fulfil our aims and objectives to the best of our abilities. Our challenge for 2017/18 is to find ways of engaging with young families and helping them to understand the relevance of our organisation in the world today. This challenge means putting our message over in current formats and reaching people where they are and identifying the needs in our communities. We must act in a supportive and welcoming way to engage with those around us.

What can you do to take this forward in your community?

Through prayer and action, we can take on this challenge.

I look forward to meeting members on Lady Day on 25 March at St Mary' Cathedral at 11am. Followed by a bring and share lunch. Further information will be sent to the branch leaders about the arrangements.

Lent is a journey. So at the end of Lent we should expect to find ourselves somewhere different from where we started.


Lent can be an opportunity to explore what is the nature of the promised Kingdom of God on earth that we long for; a time to discern how we are called to work for it.



Labelled For Life



Annual Theme - Faith in Action - our theme for 2017 (*from the MU Website*)

We follow on from our year of celebration in 2016 when we gave thanks for God's faithfulness to Mothers' Union over 140 years and acknowledged that: Thus far the Lord has helped us. 1 Samuel 7:12 We now look to the future trusting that God will continue to help us as we share his love in the world through our Christian care for families and communities. We do this by actively putting our faith into action to serve God and his world. This is no new concept for us as Mothers' Union; rather it has always been at the heart of our mission and outreach. So 2017 is a year for us to highlight the ways in which we already live out our faith though action; it is also an opportunity for us to consider new ways in which to do so, being ever aware of the changing needs of society, and always looking to God for his guidance and provision.

Hazel Treadgold - Mothers' Union received the sad news just before Christmas of her passing. Hazel Treadgold was Central President of our organisation from 1983 – 1988. She passed away peacefully at home on Monday 19th December 2016, surrounded by her loving family. A private funeral service took place on Friday 30th December. A Thanksgiving Service to celebrate Hazel's life was held in Chichester Cathedral on Friday 27th January 2017 at 3pm. Current Worldwide President Lynne Tembey said "I was very sorry to hear of Hazel's passing and extend to her family our deep sorrow, love and sympathy at this time. Hazel was an inspirational lady, she travelled to many parts of the world on behalf of Mothers' Union, she was a great encourager. Before becoming Central President, she was Central Young Families Chairperson, as "family" was very important to her. Hazel was fun to be around, and a real bubbly character. She was also on the working group which helped with the planning of the 1988 Lambeth Wives Conference. I pray that members will remember with love and great affection Hazel's leadership, faithfulness and commitment to Mothers' Union, and especially remember Marcus, Joanna and their families at this time. I pray that Hazel may she rest in peace eternal and rise in glory".

Domestic Abuse law to change following Mothers' Union campaign

In Nov., a petition for changes to the statutory Child Maintenance Service, signed by 4,500 of its members and supporters was delivered to Downing Street by Lynne Tembey and Bev Julien. The aim is to prevent survivors of domestic abuse from being forced to re-engage with their former partner, often the perpetrator of the violence against them. Mothers' Union, which represents over four million members worldwide, welcomed the announcement by Prime Minister Theresa May that current legislation governing domestic abuse in England and Wales is to be overhauled. Mothers' Union is

campaigning for survivors to be exempt from the 'collect and pay' charges imposed for using the statutory Child Maintenance Service. They may have no other option to receive or make payments for their children without further risk of control, abuse or violence. Currently, one in three applicants to the child maintenance service have experienced domestic abuse and MU strongly urges that the government puts the safety and welfare of the survivors of domestic abuse at the core of its proposals for change.
