

Letter from the Diocesan President: March 2011

Dear Fellow Members,

The snow drops are gently swaying in the wind, the fat crocus buds are ready to open in the sun – I think Spring is on the way. After a long, cold white, winter, we are all looking for colour and warmth. I look around the garden each day and notice new bulbs shooting up, the birds are emptying the bird feeders and some days the sun shines warmly. It is great!





This is a Provincial event – members from the other Dioceses are part of the team and we are grateful for their active part in the organization of both days. Each member of the Team brings their own special gift which has been essential in ensuring that everything is planned for. The Faith representatives have organized the Service and visited the Cathedral several times, trying to pack in as many members as possible for the service.

Faithful Relationships, the theme for the year, means many things. Obviously our faithfulness to God is most important, but so easily forgotten. As a friend once said "If my relationship with God is right, then my relationship with everyone/everything else is right" Some days it is glaringly obvious that I've failed. It might sound easy BUT.... Perhaps that should be my Lent focus. I've been thinking about Lent – it is so different from years ago when it seemed to be taken more seriously – we gave something up (something we liked!) and gave the money to Charity. Now we take something up – but is that as difficult as no biscuits? As well as being faithful friends, relatives during difficult times are we always faithful to our own selves? Do we always stand for what we believe is right? In a world more "me" orientated, "my rights", "my freedom" etc do we realize that this may curtail someone's rights, freedom? Do we take responsibility for our actions? It takes courage (and we may not be popular) to say what we believe when others dismiss for being "churchy".

The Diocesan presidents' Conference was very good and informative but the financial state makes it difficult for us to continue with the work planned. Our overseas commitment continues but the Development Officers (Workers) have not had a pay increase and their travel grant has been cut by 70%. All staff had their salaries frozen and there are 7 staff vacancies – staff left to take up other jobs and no-one was made redundant. There will be more information on the Conference at Council in April.

Let us look forward to the Lady Day Service and rejoice. Our thanks go to Bishop Brian for supporting us so well over the years and we wish him and Lissa a happy and healthy retirement.

Letter from Edinburgh MU Chaplain

I seem to be glued to radio and TV as the world's tragedies unfold. Just as we were all buoyed up by the relatively peaceful handover of power in Tunisia and Egypt, we were confronted by the implacability of Gaddafi and the horror of people caught up in a situation with no clear resolution likely and where danger and fear become constant elements in daily life. Now North Africa takes a back seat in the press. While the horrors of the Christchurch earthquake still tear at our hearts, Japan faces a far worse disaster.

There has been a suggestion that we might use Lent to watch TV with greater care and look out for all the prayer points, all the thoughts and actions and ideas which need our prayers, in the programmes we watch and there has certainly been plenty of those this week.

I questioned myself when I heard someone remark that it was more shocking to see the devastation of a city like Christchurch that looked like our cities and the grief of people who looked like us and spoke our language. It does bring the fragility of life closer to home ands hopefully will help us to relate better, to be more compassionate now that another earthquake brings death and destruction to a more unfamiliar part of the world.

Mobile phones, email, Skype, Twitter, Facebook and all the other means of communication now in use make the world a smaller place, bringing the terrors and joys of life today closer to us. We can enjoy the blessing of being able to be more closely in touch with family and friends. Let us pray that this will make the world a more compassionate and caring place as we live in closer contact with each other and that human discoveries and inventions of our time will be put to better use than some earlier ones. Have you ever wondered what Jesus would have done if he'd had a Blackberry?

There was great excitement and rejoicing in Sudan when all the Diocesan Presidents met for the first time in many year. The long, ongoing war had prevented travel between the North and South.

The Presidents worked on the future work of the Mothers' union with Sudan and made plans etc for the coming years.

The country has held an election re the separation of the South from the North, but as I understand it, the Mothers' union will continue to work together.

In Mwpapwa They are hoping and praying for gentle rains for their crops. Looking for food takes so much time and energy that the Mothers' Union programmes were severely disrupted. I am waiting for further news.

We have heard nothing from our Link in Nigeria.

In Sri Lanka the members are still working with the refugees from the North in the camps and also helping those affected by the severe floods. They think that the majority of the rice crop has been ruined. They work very hard and are waiting for information on how they can help the flood even more.

All our Links need our prayers and we must be very grateful for our blessings.

PROVINCIAL RETREAT: was held from Tuesday 5th to Thursday 7th April 2011 and was led by the Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway, the Rt. Revd. Dr. Gregor Duncan.



Paul Hindle's wife, Pat, is now the Retreat organizer: Below are extracts from the report.

"Learning from the Psalms" was the theme for the retreat led by Bishop Gregor, Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway. Julia Mason and myself went and enjoyed it very much. He chose Psalms which had a meaning for him and included personal information while talking about these Psalms. The Psalms he chose were – Psalm 8, 19, 23 (perhaps the most well known of all the Psalms) 51 (a penitential Psalm), and 84. Each address ended with a

musical setting of that psalm, some of which sent shivers up my spine. There were many well known verses, phrases in these Psalms which I recognized but did not know where they came from. Many are attributed to David. There was also time to ourselves to pray, think read. There was Morning Prayer, Evening Prayer and Compline plus two Eucharists. Saying the Psalms together helped with the understanding and to appreciate the poetry of them.

The Lady Day Service, which was held in St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral, Edinburgh on Friday, 25th March was attended by the Provincial Scottish President, Hilary Moran. Bishop Brian presided and preached. Marion Rowley read Isaiah 11: 1-10 and the Gospel was read by the Cathedral Chaplain, Revd Nicki McKelly. The MU Chaplain, Revd Jennifer Edie led the Intercessions. The following is a précis of the address:

The Bishop opened his address by saying that 2011 is a special year in the life of this Cathedral, the mother church of the diocese. George Gilbert Scott, its architect was born in 1811 on 18 July. He went on to say, that today in our thoughts and prayers, earthquakes are in our mind and we remember the people of Japan. He referred to the fact that earthquakes, and their resultant Tsunamis, have been part of the history in Western Europe. The earthquake that took place in the Atlantic in 1761 (250 years ago) was described as a 'small earthquake in London'. It followed the more famous earthquake of 1755 in Lisbon. This earthquake shattered the optimism of Europe and called in question the whole philosophy that we live in the best of all possible worlds. It stimulated Voltaire to write Candide, and significantly influenced thinkers in the Scottish Enlightenment

The Geologist Charles Lyell who was born in Scotland about 15 miles north of Dundee, commented on the effects of the 1755 earthquake, that "In no part of the volcanic region of Southern Europe has so tremendous an earthquake occurred in modern times as that which began on the 1st of November, 1755, at Lisbon. A sound of thunder was heard underground, and immediately afterwards a violent shock threw down the greater part of that city. In the course of about six minutes, sixty thousand persons perished. The sea first retired and laid the bar dry; it then rolled in, rising fifty feet above its ordinary level......

The effect was felt by ships in the Atlantic, and lakes, rivers, and springs in Great Britain were greatly agitated. At Loch Lomond, in Scotland, for example, the water, without the least apparent cause, rose against its banks, and then subsided below its usual level. The greatest perpendicular height of this swell was two feet four inches. It all caused people to question the idea that we lived in a world under the care of a benevolent and kindly God. Nature that can seem benign suddenly becomes terrible without warning and surprises us. And of course we also recall that it was in 1911 that the Titanic was launched. Nature is at times red in tooth and claw, hostile to human nature; and at times beautiful, and evocative of the divine life.;

And so to Lady Day 2011. In Luke's gospel we hear of Mary's discovery that she is pregnant. Will this be seen as a cause of disgrace, or a sign of salvation? And in Luke, the angel offers an interpretation, of the ambiguity of her situation so as to give her hope.

And this sums up our charge as members of the Mother's Union.

Our calling is to interpret the ambiguity of things to people such that they can live in God's world with hope. It is a significant calling. It is a calling seen in the mission of that angel. It is a calling that calls us to address the needs of Japan, the homeless, the neglected and the abused. The world is not just a meaningless jumble of events, but a place wherein we can discern something of the God who was seen in Jesus Christ. And seeing that gives hope for the future. AMEN -
